Transatlantic collaborations for S.H.O.P.

At Fanjeaux we were very flattered to receive an invitation from Janet Welsh op, director of the Mc Greal Centre at Dominican University Chicago, to provide a keynote speaker at the 9th "In Our Keeping" symposium in June 2008.

As the Mc Greal Centre is very much a sister organization, we had always been keen to have a good working relationship with these transatlantic partners. They are working on the OPUS project and progressively publishing a detailed history of the Dominican family in the United States of America.

So in early June this year, Sr Barbara flew off to Chicago and the splendid Dominican University campus at River Forest, founded by the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters. Her talk was entitled "The Study of History in

the Transmission of Dominican Values.," in which she stressed the importance of history as a means of accessing the full Dominican identity. The Mc Greal Centre plans to publish Sr Barbara's talk in booklet form; it is also on the Domlife website.

The participants (sisters, friars and laity) were a mixture of archivists, historians and people simply interested in our history.

During the course of the week, Sr Barbara also directed a workshop session on the activities of the S.H.O.P. project.

Jésus de Senaux, the 17th century foundress of the first two Dominican monasteries in Paris. Sr Gabrielle is also acting as guide at the House of St Dominic in Fanjeaux. (see page 3).

The Monasticon Matrix Project and a symposium for women historians of monasticism in Brittany

An unusual symposium was organized in July this year by the Department of Religion, History and Gender Studies of the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, which originated the Monasticon Matrix on-line bibliographies, for the study of the history of monasticism.

Firstly the location was out of the ordinary: a fairytale castle in the middle of a lake, in the beautiful Breton countryside. The 10 women scholars who participated were, in equal numbers, Europeans (English, Belgian, Italian and Macedonian) and Americans, and specialists in the history of either Buddhist or Christian female monasticism in the pre-modern period.

This very special occasion was generously funded by the Borchard foundation, Southern California, which regularly sponsors such international scholarly exchanges. The title of the symposium was "Religious Women in the Pre-modern world—new vocabularies for cross-cultural study." Each participant prepared a paper which was distributed in advance to the others, and the time at La Bretesche was spent in discussion of each other's work, with Professor Lisa Bitel in the chair.

Sr Barbara of S.H.O.P. spoke on "Historiography and mythology in the study of the medieval religious woman", using Prouilhe as a case study. It is planned that these papers will be published.

Anniversaries and Jubilees

Obviously there has been much talk recently of the 800th anniversary of the founding of the monastery at Prouilhe, and rightly so. But other communities have also chalked


up significant landmarks this year.

In particular, this spring the monastery at Regensburg, Bavaria, in Germany celebrated the 775th anniversary of its foundation. And in contrast

to Prouilhe, the sisters have been there without interruption since 1233. Not that they escaped persecution completely. To conform with demands of public utility they were required to found a school in the 18th century. The school still exists, and the monastery alongside it.

Once Fr Brian Pierce op had agreed to act as interpreter, Sr Barbara accepted the idea of making such a long journey, as it was possible to combine it with the trip to Chicago.


The enthusiasm and attentiveness of the thirty-seven young sisters in the class made the whole undertaking eminently worthwhile. During the week subjects such as the history of the constitutions of Dominican nuns and the history of the form of profession were studied.

For the final day of the course, each monastery had prepared a presentation of its own history. These were excellently done and the sisters

promised to write them down. So we look forward to having them on the shelves of the S.H.O.P. library before too long.

Particularly interes

ing is the history of the monastery at Cuzco, built on the site of an Inca temple of virgins consecrated to the sun In all of these histories, mention was repeatedly made of how the monasteries had been destroyed by earthquakes over the course of the centuries. They remain an ever present danger.

The book is entitled Santas y Beatas de la Orden de Predicadores (1207-2007) (Women saints and blesseds of the Order of Preachers). With over 400 pages, it is a mine of useful information about our illustrious forebears. Sr Irene approaches the subject by the branch of the order to which the


saints belonged, and ir chronological order.


