President's Message

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Our theme at last year's Provincial Council meeting was Gratitude. Gratitude, in this context, meant to me an awareness of what I have and a desire to share it. This is, of course, a central theme of our vocation.

My own gratitude was to my predecessors in this job who brought us through the years following the great Council which so unexpectedly precipitated a momentous change in our perceptions of Church and our own vocations. Now that we are more settled and have incorporated a better understanding of the daily liturgy, we have, for the most part, come to a better integration of it with our devotional prayer.

This has also been reflected in the subject and style of our Chapter study. I think the level of material for most has advanced beyond the devotional.

These dramatic changes which I had lived through led me to consider the thoughts I have presented to you this year. In anticipation of our next meeting which will initiate our own "Year of the Laity" in the Order, I have tried to develop the theme of evolutionary change and our need to start more closely examining community and mission. These two 'pillars' will be the theme of this year's Provincial Council meeting.

This is the last in a series of four messages in our *Challenge*. The first appeared in the Fall of last year, right after I was elected Provincial President. My first message emphasized the ongoing need for self-examination in our prayer practices and purpose in our study in relation to our preaching:

"When we come together to pray, is the cause to become closer to Jesus through our community, especially in the Eucharist? Do we get so caught up in being on the right page and saying the right words that we lose sight of the cause for gathering? Do we say our daily liturgical prayer in the spirit of the Church's liturgy which joins us to all God's creation in singing his praise; or do we say words to fulfill a duty? Does our study lead us closer to the cause of our study, Jesus? Does our 'preaching' take place only in highly refined and constrained circumstances? Does our 'preaching' reflect our unique position in society in our ability to be witnesses to Jesus in our daily circumstances? Are we active in civic affairs? Are we active in social, parish and charitable groups? Where does our positive influence show up in our week? How are we more fully entering into and bringing others to the Kingdom which is for all? We are a very small segment of the Church. Are we a very withdrawn and reserved segment? If so, how do we see our unique mission? I would think that of any group we should

be consistently changing ourselves to better incorporate ourselves and help others to incorporate themselves into the great mystery which we call the Body of Christ."

In the next issue, I issued a sort of challenge to our groups which built on this theme:

"How do we 'bear witness' as individual communities and as a province? We have a provincial mission statement. Do we strive to live up to it? Does my group/chapter have a mission statement? Do we each have a rationale for existence? We are the members of the Order best positioned for reaching out into the community. Do we spend much energy and planning on how to do this? Are we just internally focused by default? Are we examples of unity and understanding in our own gatherings?"

In the last issue, I gave us food for thought directly from our new Bishop of Rome because his extensive comments from the time of the Aparecida Conference stated the reality so well: "It's key that we Catholics, both clergy and laity, go out to meet the people," he stressed in the 2010 book-length interview *El Jesuita*.

In a 2011 interview with an Argentinian Catholic news agency, he said this contagious spiritual sickness comes from a clericalism that passes from clergy to laypeople. "We priests tend to clericalize the laity. We do not realize it, but it is as if we infect them with our own disease. And the laity — not all, but many — ask us on their knees to clericalize them, because it is more comfortable to be an altar server than the protagonist of a lay path. We cannot fall into that trap — it is a sinful complicity."

Now in this last of the series leading to a Council meeting which will take a close look at a true "Year of the Laity" in our province, I ask you to pray for the Council members as we consider more closely how we can implement these core constituents of a Lay Dominican vocation. Share your thoughts with your delegate.

Are we doing what we have been consistently called to do? Can we do it differently or better? Have we examined our practices and customs in the light of 21st century reality? Are we taking our expected place in raising our voices in issues of social justice? Are we supporting each other in our works? Our documents reflect those astonishing days, 50 years ago, of Vatican II when John XXIII "flung open the windows of the Church to let in the fresh air of the Holy Spirit." Does the atmosphere of our meetings reflect the vocabulary of the Council; are they truly places of participation, partnership, dialogue, friendship, invitation and welcome? Is this communicated to others? Not easy questions ever, but questions that must consistently be asked.

GET TO KNOW OUR NEW PROVINCIAL PROMOTER, FR. JERRY STOOKEY!



Jerry was born in Belleville, Illinois and raised on a beef farm in a large Catholic family. He received Catholic education from grade school to ordination. He graduated from the University of St. Thomas (St. Paul, MN), with a BA in Sociology, 1971, and then went on to Aquinas Institute of Theology (then in Dubuque, IA), as a diocesan seminarian, but soon discovered his Dominican vocation there, and entered the novitiate in 1973. He professed Solemn Vows as a

Dominican in 1977; and was ordained a priest on August 8, 1978 at St. Dominic's Parish in Denver.

From the beginning, Jerry's internships and ministries have been working with the poor and for justice and peace. He did his pastoral internship year at 8th Day Center for Justice in Chicago, 1974-1975. He earned a certificate in Community Organizing from the New Orleans Training Center in 1975. His first assignment after finishing his theology degree was to the Justice & Peace Office of the Archdiocese of Denver, from 1976-1984—the last four of those years as its director. That assignment was interrupted to fulfill the mandatory Complimentary Study Year during 1980, which Jerry completed with the Dominicans in Mexico, studying Spanish and Liberation Theology.

Jerry served in the Dominican missions in Central America from 1984 – 1991, living and working in Guatemala (6 months), Costa Rica (6 months) and Nicaragua (6 years). Although being a “missionary on horseback” was quite difficult in time of much war in Central America, Jerry says “I loved it and it is still the favorite time of my life in the Order so far.” His primary ministry there was with a team of 5 Dominican friars who trained 300 lay preachers—all of them elected by their villages to become “Delegates of the Word” in the nearly priest-less region.

Jerry returned from Central America to his home area of St. Louis in 1991, working as the chaplain for the Centro Hispano Católico, with the Spanish-speaking Catholic immigrants in the Archdiocese of St. Louis, and teaching “Social Analysis for Ministry” at Aquinas Institute of Theology (which moved from Dubuque to St. Louis shortly after Jerry graduated).

He then served as Vicar Provincial, based in Chicago from 1994-1999, at which time he was called to Santa Sabina in Rome to work at the Dominicans' international offices (the General Curia) until 2007, as the General Promoter for Dominican Laity and the Socius for North American Dominicans.

Subsequently, Jerry took his first sabbatical 2007-2008, spending 7 months in Palestine/Israel at the Ecole Biblique in Jerusalem, and then 5 months at the European Peace University in Austria. In July 2008, Jerry returned to the States, and back to Denver, and back to justice and peace ministry—as the director of the non-profit, non-denominational, non-governmental organization, the Denver Justice & Peace Committee.

In 2009, he was elected, and later re-elected, prior of St. Dominic Priory in Denver, which includes our novitiate, where he occasionally teaches the novices. In June, 2013, Jerry joined the staff at St. Dominic Parish in Denver, as part-time Parochial Vicar, primarily to help fill the Spanish-speaking needs there.

GENERAL CHAPTER CONVENES IN CROATIA

The General Chapter is the highest authority in the Order of Preachers. New policies only become practiced laws after being approved by three succeeding Chapters. This legislative body works in commissions, each with a specific topic or issue to discuss, argue about (as we Dominicans do so enjoy), and come to conclusions on. These written conclusions are then discussed with the whole body and when necessary, votes are cast.

One of the top priorities of the General Chapter in Trogir is to discuss how the Order plans to celebrate our coming jubilee year in 2016, which marks the 800th anniversary of the confirmation of the Order of Preachers by Pope Honorius III.

Another hot topic was the continued growth of the International Dominican Youth Movement (IDYM), who just celebrated their 2013 meeting in Bogota, Columbia in July. The Order has long been supporters of today's youth taking up active roles in evangelization.

All of the commissions had great debates about the most crucial topics of our day, and reached many conclusions aimed at moving the work of the Order of Preachers further towards achieving our mission of setting the world aflame.

The Commission on Study worked to solidify new regional structures that can study their own regional social problems, and better work to spread the Gospel through the very different economic, political, and social climates around the world.

The Commission on Preaching focused on the ever-growing impact of the Internet on our lives, and discussed ways in which the Order of Preachers could more efficiently incorporate social media into our preaching missions. One way suggested was for each Province to assign one co-operator brother or friar to the task of dealing with the Internet, including social media. (Though I don't think it too bold to say that the Order of Preachers has always been and still is a leader in the whole Catholic Church on how to utilize the Internet and social media in the spreading of the Gospel...though this editor is of course a little biased.)

From all early accounts, the 2013 General Chapter of Trogir was a great success, and Dominicans around the world look forward to the release of the official conclusions, the Acts of the General Chapter in Trogir.




